Unit Code and Title: ACC100 Accounting in Society

Course(s): Bachelor of Professional Accounting

Study Load: Students should expect to spend approximately 130 hours on studying and completing assignments across the study period. Unit Description:

This unit focuses on the role of accounting in society. The unit aims to introduce basic accounting language, concepts and methods. Students will be provided with an opportunity to discuss evolving means of information preparation of financial statements with an emphasis placed on understanding how such information assists users in making important business decisions. The role of accounting stewardship is explored, developing students' awareness of social, environmental and ethical concerns in an attempt to develop well-rounded business professionals.
